# Introduction

Dear partner,

We are making improvements to deliver a more streamlined, digital immigration system which will be quicker and more secure for the millions of people who pass through the UK border each year.

Electronic Travel Authorisations (ETAs) are being introduced worldwide for visitors to the UK who do not currently need a visa for short stays, or who do not already have a UK immigration status prior to travelling. Visitors can find out when they need an ETA to travel and can apply on <u>GOV.UK</u>

To prepare your customers and stakeholders for how this changes travel from Ireland into Northern Ireland and the rest of the UK, we have developed this suite of communications materials to help you share and embed ETA messages across your channels. This pack includes:

# Key messages



- Each year the UK welcomes millions of visitors from around the world. From holidays to short term study or business trips, the UK is a dynamic, diverse, and exciting destination.
- The UK is making improvements to deliver a more streamlined, digital immigration system which will be quicker and more secure for the millions of people who pass through the UK border each year, including into Northern Ireland.
- Electronic Travel Authorisations (ETAs) are being introduced worldwide for visitors to the UK who do not currently need a visa for short stays, or who do not already have a UK immigration status.
- British and Irish citizens do not need an ETA.
- An ETA is a digital permission to travel. Individuals arriving in the UK, including Northern Ireland, need to enter in line with the UK's immigration framework, including obtaining an ETA if required.
- Applying for an ETA is quick and simple. Most applicants get an automatic decision in minutes when applying through the UK ETA app, which means spontaneous trips to the UK are still possible.
- Eligible non-European visitors need an ETA to travel to the UK, including into Northern Ireland. From 2 April 2025, eligible European visitors will also need an ETA.
- An ETA costs £10 and permits multiple journeys to the UK for stays of up to six months at a time over two years or until the holder's passport expires – whichever is sooner. For more information and regular updates on ETAs, please visit <u>GOV.UK</u>

# Northern Ireland key message

Intended for customer facing channels targeting people planning to travel to the UK, including Northern Ireland, from Ireland:

Electronic Travel Authorisations (ETAs) are being introduced worldwide for visitors to the UK who do not currently need a visa for short stays, or who do not already have a UK immigration status.

People arriving in the UK, including Northern Ireland, need to enter in line with the UK's immigration framework, including obtaining an ETA if required. Check if you need an ETA to travel to the UK and apply on <u>GOV.UK</u>

- Northern Ireland, part of the UK, is a vibrant and dynamic destination attracting millions of visitors annually.
- To enhance your travel experience, we are making improvements to deliver a more streamlined, digital immigration system which will be quicker and more secure for the millions of people who pass through the UK border each year.
- Here's everything you need to know about Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA) for Northern Ireland and the rest of the UK.

#### What is an ETA

- An ETA is a digital travel permission for visitors who
- Do not currently need a visa for short stays
- Do not already have UK immigration status

#### Who needs an ETA?

- Eligible non-European visitors need an ETA to travel to the UK, including into Northern Ireland.
- From 2 April 2025: eligible European visitors will also need an ETA. They can apply from 5 March 2025.


#### • Exceptions:

- British and Irish citizens do not need an ETA
- Legal residents of Ireland, from a nationality that does not usually need a visa to visit the UK (e.g. European and US nationals), do not need an ETA when traveling within the Common Travel Area (CTA), if they can show proof of legal residency. Full guidance can be found at <u>GOV.UK</u>

#### How to apply for an ETA

 Applying for an ETA is quick and simple. The easiest way to apply for an ETA is through the 'UK ETA app', which can be downloaded from the <u>Google Play</u> or <u>Apple App Store</u>. You can apply on <u>GOV.UK</u> if you do not have access to a smartphone.
